

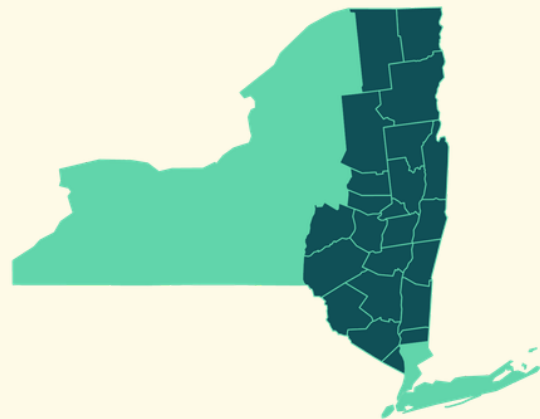


Although USDA has stopped collecting food security data, Feeding America will continue to estimate local food insecurity and meal costs. Moving forward, Feeding America is collaborating as a nationwide network of food banks, food pantries, state-wide associations and regional co-ops—in partnership with diverse partners—to explore alternative data sources from which to estimate local food insecurity in 2027 and beyond.



Across the Food Bank's 23-County Service Area

Across the Regional Food Bank's 23-county service area, the total number of people facing food insecurity rose approximately **23.2%** from 2019 to 2024, with over **351,730** people experiencing challenges associated with hunger; this number is even higher amongst children, with **16.2%** of children lacking access to the nutritious foods they need to thrive.

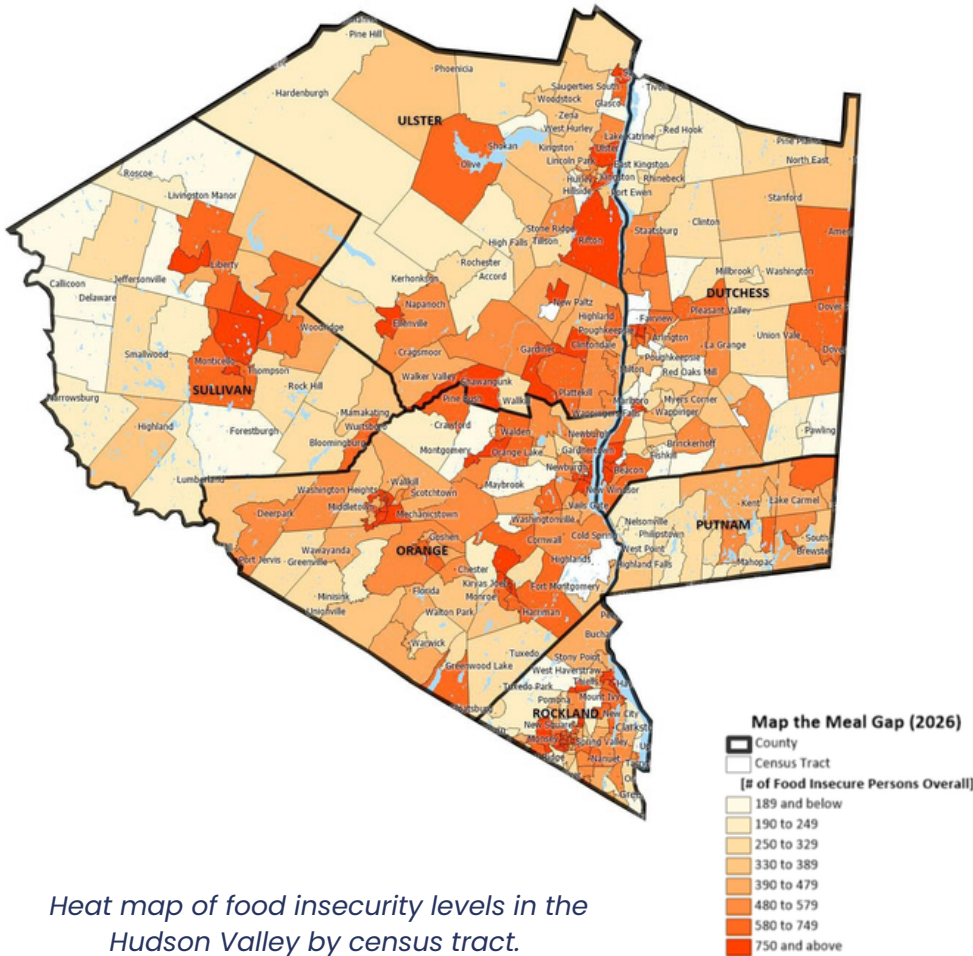


Mapping the Meal Gap

Each year, Feeding America releases a national report known as Map the Meal Gap, using publicly available data from USDA Economic Research Service, U.S. Census Bureau and Bureau of Labor Statistics to estimate local food insecurity at the county, congressional district and state levels. The study also estimates local meal costs and food budget shortfalls using food price data from NIQ, based on USDA’s Thrifty Food Plan, and grocery sales tax data. The newest Map the Meal Gap report reflects the state of food insecurity as of 2024.

167,990 neighbors in the Hudson Valley face food insecurity.

Children Facing Hunger

Food insecurity among children is 16.3%, equaling 53,390 children in the Hudson Valley who lack access to the food they need to grow, learn, and thrive. In Sullivan County, this rate is as high as 22.7%.

Food insecurity is experienced by people from all backgrounds and demographics, but disparities exist.

Most people experiencing food insecurity nationally are white, non-Hispanic. Individuals who are Black or Latino often face disproportionately higher rates. In the Hudson Valley, available data by race/ethnicity shows that 9% of white individuals, 24% of Black individuals, and 17% of Latino individuals experienced food insecurity in 2024.

Food Spending and Cost

In 2024, people in food-insecure households reported needing an **additional \$23.16 per person, per week** to have just enough money to cover their food needs. This translated to \$36.3 billion across all 53.2 million individuals in food-insecure households.

Residents of the Hudson Valley feel this firsthand, with an estimated food budget shortfall of \$127,797,000.

Individuals who were food secure in 2024 reported spending an average of \$3.70 per meal. Meal costs vary significantly by county throughout the nation, ranging from \$2.56 to \$6.28, showcasing the diverse economic challenges faced by communities.

In the Hudson Valley, the average cost per meal is **\$4.04**, which reflects the high need we see at the Regional Food Bank.

The Regional Food Bank and our partners provided food equivalent to **20,485,578 meals** in the Hudson Valley in 2025. Despite these efforts, **the current meal gap in the Hudson Valley is 31,896,300.**

Food Spending and Income

Nationally, half of all people experiencing food insecurity may not qualify for SNAP benefits due to income limits. Here in the Hudson Valley, **44%** of people facing hunger may not qualify for SNAP.
